By now, it is common knowledge that there will not be a merger between Cuming and Burt County PPDs. The Boards of each power district took their time and studied all the data needed to make a good decision and at the end of the day determined not to proceed with the merger. Some folks were shocked by the decision, others relieved, and some others were disappointed. At the end of the day, I personally am just impressed by the due diligence exercised by both boards and their willingness to see the process through even though it took much longer than any of us wanted it to.

With the merger discussion put to bed, it is time for both of us to move on. CCPPD has done that and the CCPPD Board approved our capital projects and expense budgets for 2019 at their December 12, 2018 meeting. We start the

budget process in September and it is normally approved in December. It may seem tedious, but when done properly a budget serves as a great roadmap for the year. Budgeting is a very important part of managing the District's resources.

We're entrusted with the investment that each customer-owner has made in CCPPD, so it's well worth the time to ensure that we have carefully considered each and every expenditure planned for the coming year. It is also imperative that we provide the level of service that is expected so maintenance activities and continual system improvements are a must. Projects of interest for 2019 include a full rebuild of the Substation at Bancroft.

Replacement of some vehicles. Some tie lines to install and other lines to rebuild. We will also continue to remove trees and brush from the rights of ways and to test poles for rot. This year we will also utilize a contractor who will provide CCPPD with an entire inventory of our plant. Along with

the inventory they will provide GPS way-points for every structure, transformer, and underground cable. This will greatly improve our mapping system and allow us to better account for our plant and determine outage causes and needed maintenance more rapidly and pro-actively.

Time spent in necessary and important pursuits is never wasted. The time spent to create the budget that we follow is necessary and important as was the time spent to consider the consolidation. Both were well worth the effort and work. Looking forward, we have much to do in the coming year, but we are up to the task and will gladly put in the time to provide you with the excellent service that you have come to expect. ## 10 Simple Ways to Stay Warm & Save Energy

- 1. **Open the drapes.** The sun's rays will help heat your home for free. Let them shine in through south-facing windows all day. Then, cover the windows once the sun goes down.
- 2. **Dress in layers.** It costs a lot less to pull on a sweater or wrap a blanket around you while you watch TV than it does to move the thermostat up even a couple of degrees. Add a couple throw rugs to tile and wood floors, and keep blankets on the sofa. Wear socks and fuzzy slippers indoors.
- 3. **Humidify.** An electric humidifier will add moisture to the air, which makes it feel warmer and helps retain the heat. Your whole house will feel more comfortable if the air isn't too dry.
- 4. **Open heating vents.** And move furniture and other items away from them so they're not blocked and can do a good job of evenly distributing warm air through the house.
- 5. **Turn on the fans.** Flip the switch that makes the blades spin clockwise so they push heated air, which naturally rises, back down into the room.

- 6. **Turn off exhaust fans.** Kitchen and bathroom fans serve an important purpose, they clear the air of humidity and odors. But once the air clears, turn them off. The longer a fan runs, the more heated air it send into the great outdoors.
- 7. **Add insulation.** Especially if your home is older, the attic insulation might have fallen out of place and even diminished over the years. That could mean heat is escaping through the roof.
- 8. **Tune up your furnace.** Call a professional HVAC technician to inspect and repair your system and change its filters.
- 9. Lower the temperature at bedtime. Throw an extra blanket on your bed and turn the thermostat down 10 degrees before you turn in. You could save up to 10 percent on your heating bill if you let your house cool off a bit for eight hours.
- 10. Close the fireplace damper once the fire dies down. An open damper when the fireplace is not in use lets warm air escape through the chimney.
